Daily Update - October 28th

Let's continue to spend time reflecting on God's word in prayerful quiet today, remembering God's faithfulness to us in his word and in his Spirit.

Pause

"Be still and know that I am God". Lord, may your spirit guide me to seek Your Loving presence more and more. For it is there I find rest and refreshment from this busy world.

Rejoice

I rejoice in God's voice today, reminding myself that he calls me to trust him with the

ancient words of all God's people in Psalm 119:89-96

Your word, Lord, is eternal;

it stands firm in the heavens.

Your faithfulness continues through all generations;

you established the earth, and it endures.

Your laws endure to this day,

for all things serve you.

If your law had not been my delight,

I would have perished in my affliction.

I will never forget your precepts,

for by them you have preserved my life.

Save me, for I am yours;

I have sought out your precepts.

The wicked are waiting to destroy me,

but I will ponder your statutes.

To all perfection I see a limit,

but your commands are boundless.

John 15:17-27

Remember what I told you, 'A servant is not greater than his master.' 'There may be trouble ahead,' so the song line goes. Within the call to follow Jesus is the central expectation, 'love each other.' As the disciples were to live out this 'Golden Rule', they were always going to encounter curiosity, suspicion and often opposition. Opposition against what they stood for, for what they believed and for how they lived. This world's attitude, one that has ultimately always rejected Christ, would soon have Jesus crucified and is the prevailing attitude that pervades today. We may be considered quirky, for our beliefs, hypocritical for daring to define 'God's love', out of touch with a society that has moved on while we cling to our vestiges of historical religious privilege. Meanwhile extremists in both camps polarise the arguments, adding fuel to the waiting fire. What Jesus is preparing his followers for then, is to have the fortitude to keep going when opposition comes. Things that come unexpectedly often cause us to question either what we believe that took us along that path, or even whether we are still heading where we thought we were. We need to be sure about why we believe what we believe, before it is tested to breaking point. But, if we are walking with Jesus, opposition, amongst the unexpected things that come against us, are to be expected. Even when we are doing 'good' people can be suspicious and we can be caught off guard. A compliment becomes a criticism, 'You are really kind, if only you were just a bit more.....'

People will almost certainly identify us with Jesus if we are doing and saying the sorts of things Jesus would. So, if the world, under the rule of Satan, rejected Jesus, why would it treat his 'weaker' followers any better? We should take comfort from that, without looking for trouble, opposition is a privilege the apostles rejoiced in, (Acts 4 & 5).

What keeps us going then, is the same truth that made a promise with Abraham, inspired Joseph, spoke for Moses and consoled David is that God has made himself known and now lives with us. The world might not like us or understand us, but Jesus LOVES us and it cannot overcome us. We need to feed ourselves with those truths everyday ready for any circumstance. Each time we read and pray, to expect something strengthening, for we do not live on bread alone.

Father help me to live this day to the full, being true to you in every way.

Jesus help me to give myself away to others, being kind to everyone I meet

Spirit, help me to seek the lost, proclaiming Christ in all I do and say.

Hi everyone, I'm sure that we are all more than aware, that as of last Sunday the evenings have started to draw in and the weather has become increasingly wetter. We could be excused for feeling a bit glum! However, the families' ministry has embraced Autumn, as it has given us the opportunity to move the Families Step Together service from outside to inside the church.

This Sunday (25th October), Kim opened the doors of church and gave five families a really warm welcome as, for the first time since the lockdown, we came inside to worship Jesus together in a COVID secure, social distanced, environment. The topic couldn't have been more fitting. It was trust! Kim and I couldn't have been more delighted with how the service went and with how many families made the decision to make the transition of worshipping outside to inside.



Alpha Youth:

I want to share with you another really exciting initiative! It's called Alpha Youth. Alpha Youth is a young peoples' group that meets every Sunday morning from 09:45 - 10:45. The group has a nucleus of eleven young people aged between 9 - 13 years old and meets in the centre lounge.

So far, this group has been a fantastic success as we use the Alpha Youth material and video to explore the Christian Faith and Christ's relevance to our lives. We have looked at two sessions' so far:

Life. Is this it? Who is Jesus?

We've also explored questions that the young people have asked. Questions like:

(1): What is heaven like?

- (2): How did God feel when he changed water into wine?
- (3): Why did God give us free will if He knew it would cause suffering?

As well as being Christ focused, the team and I have designed each session to be fun, by incorporating fun ice-breaker games and challenges, as well as creating an environment where Christian friendships can be established. This is all underpinned by the relaxed and open environment where young people can discover and explore the person hood of Christ whilst being free to express their own questions.

Message from The Treasurer, Alan McNeill

Introducing the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS):

Thank you for your financial support of St Johns during this very difficult time. We really appreciate your commitment. As you know, the church is not free and your regular giving keeps us running. From last years accounts the expenses were £13,500 a month with the largest items being our payment to the diocese of £6,000 a month and £3,000 a month for staff salaries.

The Parish Giving Scheme has been introduced by the Diocese as a better way to give to St Johns church regularly. You have the option to donate monthly, quarterly or annually.

You also have the option to give linked to the rate of inflation so your donation is "inflation proofed".

If you are a tax payer then PGS claims the Gift Aid monthly, 25 per cent added to your giving, directly for us. That saves a huge amount of our administrative effort and improves our cash flow.

If you do not pay tax, please enrol in PGS as your way of regularly supporting the work of St Johns.

The scheme is paid for by our Diocese. St Johns PCC have voted to introduce the scheme to church members and have taken the lead with enrolling in the scheme. Their feedback has been positive; it is easy to complete the form and send it off. You can increase or decrease your giving at any time.

Please consider prayerfully how much you give. The last thing we want is for you to get into financial difficulties.
